SAMPLE PROGRAM PLAN FOR FHS MAJOR REQUIREMENTS

There are many ways to progress through the FHS program. This chart is only **one example** of possible sequencing for FHS major requirements. Faculty designed the FHS program to (a) create some flexibility in which courses you take and when, (b) allow you to take additional classes related to another major or a minor, and (c) graduate in four years. Four to five academic courses (a total of approximately 15-16 credits) are recommended per term. **Be sure to meet with a COE academic advisor each term to discuss additional university requirements required for your degree**.
